John 1. 29-42

Jesus revealed as the Lamb of God



Names are chosen for us, usually by parents. Sometimes we get nicknames. Some of us may choose to use a middle name as the one by which we want to be known. Often we abbreviate our names. Whatever we do with it, our name is important.

In the church calendar, the season of Epiphany (which means 'revelation') invites us to look at how Jesus is revealed, and often this involves a name. At Christmas, the child we worship is named Jesus ('Saviour') but is also referred to as Emmanuel ('God with us'). At His baptism, God calls Jesus His 'beloved Son'. Today it is the turn of John the Baptist to give Jesus a title: 'The Lamb of God'.

This title is hugely significant. When we think of lambs, we may imagine newly born ones leaping and frolicking around under the watchful eyes of their mothers. Some of us may be thinking of a lovely accompaniment to our mint sauce or Biryani. But Jewish people of the time of Jesus were more likely to have gone in their minds to lambs sacrificed in worship of God at the temple. It is clear that this is in John's thoughts as he says: "*Here is the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world!*" He sees Jesus coming towards him and makes this declaration.

Seeing Jesus as the sacrificial lamb has informed much of our theology of the cross. Lambs were used in sin offering for individuals, but John foresees Jesus doing this for the whole world. The book of Revelation often refers to the Lamb on the throne as a way of talking about Jesus: the Lamb who won the victory over sin and death. This imagery is picked up in many of our worship songs. But Jesus being the Lamb of God is not the main thrust of John 1. 29-42. This passage is more about how people respond to this title.

We have Andrew and another unnamed disciple of John the Baptist, hearing him declare Jesus as the Lamb of God and being fascinated enough by this to follow Jesus and ask Him where he was staying. They spent time with Jesus and were so impacted by this that Andrew rushed to find his brother Simon saying: "*We have found the Messiah*". Simon was in turn so fascinated that he went with Andrew and met Jesus for himself who renamed him 'Peter'.

What do we know about Jesus? What has been revealed to us about Him? Do we find it so exciting and fascinating that we want to tell others about it? Being the Lamb of God may not grab us in quite the same way. However, knowing our sins are forgiven or Jesus is God with us or that He is the Messiah (anointed by God to open the way for us all to enter freely into a relationship with the Living God), should encourage us all to go to our friends and family and share the revelations we have had of who Jesus is.
