



Acts 14. 8-18



HEALINGS IN ACTS

Jesus promised: "Very truly, I tell you, the one who believes in me will also do the works that I do and, in fact, will do greater works than these, because I am going to the Father." (John 14.12.) Jesus expects us to do the things He did. And what are they? In the main, this involved preaching/ teaching, healing, exorcisms, miracles, and acts of love done

without prejudice. So it should come as no surprise to us that we read of all these things in Acts.

The very first healing is found in Acts 3. 1-11 when Peter heals a lame man in Jesus' name. This parallels the first recorded healing of Jesus in Mark 2 when He heals a paralysed man. The ministry of Peter and John included healing the sick and those possessed by evil spirits, with crowds gathering to witness the healings (Acts 5.12-16). Philip (one of the Greek Jews appointed as a Deacon) performs healings in Jesus' name. *"For unclean spirits, crying out with a loud voice, came out of many who had them, and many who were paralyzed or lame were healed."* (Acts 8. 7.) Peter sees Aeneas healed and Dorcas raised from the dead in Acts 9. 36-41. Ananias prays for Saul's sight to be restored in Acts 9.

As the focus shifts from Peter to Paul around Acts 13, we start to see miracles of healing being attributed to Paul. In our passage for today, Paul and Barnabas are in Lystra (modern day Turkey) and they see a crippled man who has faith to be healed. Unfortunately this healing resulted in the crowds seeing them as two Greek gods come to earth. Despite their best efforts to show their humanity and point to Jesus, many still misunderstood. This passage talks of the man having faith to be healed, but we know from the healings of Jesus and others recorded in Acts, the faith of the recipient is not a prerequisite for healings (for example, see the healing of Publius' father on Malta in Acts 28.7-8). Paul performs exorcisms (Acts 16.16-18) and sees Eutychus restored to life (Acts 20.9-10).

There are also stories recorded of healings by proxy. Peter's shadow was believed to have healing power, with people bringing the sick to be touched by it (Acts 5.15). Handkerchiefs touched by Paul's skin were taken to the sick, and they were healed (Acts 19.11-12).

What do we learn from all this? It was not just the apostles praying for and seeing people healed. Not everyone will understand what is happening. Faith of the recipient is not a prerequisite. Healing is done in the name of Jesus (all the glory to Him!).

And today, it is still true that we should be doing and expecting to see the things that Jesus did in our church. In fact, as He promised, we should be seeing GREATER things. So when you pray for healing or receive prayers for healing, expect God to act in love and for our best.
